BOARD NOTES - JANUARY

The Board of Directors met at the home of Deborah D'Amico in Brookline.

Membership Secretary Mary Blomberg reported that as of November 30, our membership stood at 407 members - a slight increase over last year at that time.

The Board approved a proposal from the English Dance Committee to establish a 5-month series of third Sunday dances for experienced English dancers. The dances will be held at the Unitarian Church in Belmont beginning in February.

Dan Pearl reported that the new location for the Tuesday Night Contras and Squares series - 7 Temple Street in Cambridge - has been working out nicely and receiving favorable responses from those attending. Dan hopes to see many faces, old and new, at this long-standing series.

The Board approved the Playford Ball budget submitted by Stephanie Jack. The Ball will be held on March 9, at the Perkins School in Watertown. Further details are enclosed with this newsletter.

Cathy Mason spoke to the Board on behalf of Muddy River Morris. Muddy River will be sponsoring a dance in the spring to help raise money for their summer tour of England. CDS will be assisting Muddy River with publicity and set-up.

Deborah D'Amico presented a preliminary budget for the jointly-sponsored English-Scottish Week to be held at Pinewoods in July. Please look for the flyer accompanying this newsletter.

Mary Stafford reported that she has attended a series of courses, on behalf of CDS, which have been offered by the Arts Extension Service of Greater Boston. The courses cover several issues of particular interest to people who work with non-profit organizations.

The February Board meeting will be held at the Church of Our Savior in Brookline at 6:30PM on Friday, February 1. Any member is welcome to attend. Please contact Dan Pearl if interested.

This monthly dance, although aimed at experienced dancers, will not be identical in format to First Fridays. The hope is that Fridays will become evenings when dances of moderate and greater difficulty will be done with a minimum of talk-though; and that Sundays will be limited to dances of higher-level difficulty, including ones new to the repertoire. The Board of Directors met at the Church of Our Savior in Brookline on Friday, January 4.

Treasurer Harvey Cohen reported that high attendance at CDS events made December a very good month for the society's finances. The Tuesday series at 7 Temple Street continues to attract a consistent and enthusiastic crowd, the Christmas Party at Perkins School was a huge success, and the First Fridays series continues to prosper.

The Board discussed the current condition of Hannum Hall at 7 Temple Street and is exploring the possibility of making repairs and improvements with the help of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society, Boston Branch, and the Cambridge YWCA. The Board feels that the hall is of substantial value to CDS because of the ease of parking, the central location, and ready access to public transportation, and recognizes the importance of keeping it in the best condition possible. Members will be kept abreast of plans as they develop.

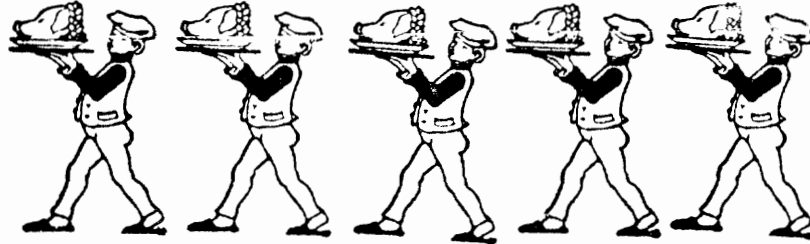

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RALPH PAGE 1903 - 1985

The entire world of traditional dance was saddened to learn of the death of Ralph Page of Keene, New Hampshire, on February 21. Ralph was known to the world as an authority on New England dance and folklore, but he was also known by many of us as a friend.

In 1937, with Beth Tolman, Ralph published The Country Dance Book (Countryman Press), an important book that captured the essence of contra dancing at that time. By 1938, he had begun on his career as a full-time dance caller.

Ralph's first regular appearance in the Boston area was in the early 40's, for a bi-weekly dance for the Belmont Country Dancers. In 1943, Ralph began a stint as the caller for a Tuesday night dance at the Boston YWCA. He participated in the CDS "drop-in" series that ran from 1940 to 1975.

With Mary Gillette and Phillip Sharples, Ralph founded NEFFA in 1944. Ralph and Mary were honored at the 1984 Festival.

Ralph leaves a legacy of publications. Northern Junket is the title of his homespun New England journal, published irregularly, that contained dances, folklore, news, recipes, and unabashedly candid opinion. Ralph also wrote The Ralph Page Book of Contras (EFDSS 1969), Heritage Dances of Early America (Lloyd Shaw 1976), and An Elegant Collection of Contras and Squares (Lloyd Shaw 1984). His calling can be heard on the 78rpm Folk Dancer disks.

I'll remember Ralph for his steadfast reverence for tradition. He frequently campaigned against developments in Modern Western (Club) Square dancing, where he felt the proponents had lost sight of the essence of enjoyable dancing. I'll also remember his unflappable Yankee demeanor and earthy wit.

Ralph's life is the stuff of which legends are made. Callers, dancers, and friends the world over will see that the legends live on, of the man who was "too old to run and too fat to fight."

The April meeting had not been scheduled at press time. Contact Mary Stafford for more information. All members are welcome at Board meetings.

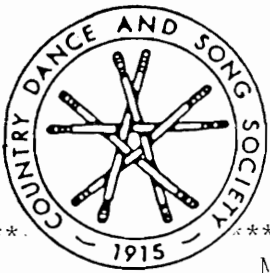

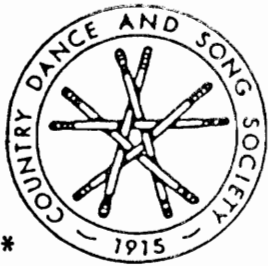

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Minutes of the July 15 Board Meeting

The Board of Directors met at the home of Mary Stafford on July 15. Eleven voting members were present as well as several guests.

After many years of volunteer service as Membership Secretary, Mary Blomberg has stepped down. The Board thanked her for her dedication and approved Arthur Ferguson as the new Membership Secretary. Arthur reported that, as of July 11, 1985, CDS has 514 members.

Dan Pearl proposed a new payment system by which musicians and callers would be paid for their services on the night of their performance whenever possible. The Board approved Dan's proposal, expressing a desire to be as supportive as possible of the talent it so regularly depends upon.

Adam Moskowitz presented the tentative Ritual Series Program for the '85-'86 season. There will be a slight increase in the enrollment fee and a series discount will be offered for participants who sign up for, and attend, an entire series. The proposed schedule includes several Morris classes and a Rapper class.

Sandy Borden reported that the CDS Food Booth at NEFFA '85 was tremendously successful, realizing a profit of over \$1500!

There was much discussion of the proposed Pinewoods calendar for the upcoming summers with particular interest focused on the summer of '86 and the "July 4th" weekend (July 3-7). The Board feels strongly that it would like to use that weekend for its traditional July Fourth Weekend. A subcommittee consisting of Charlie Hornig, Deborah D'Amico, Adam Moskowitz, and Harvey Cohen will be meeting with leaders from FAC and RSCDS to discuss a joint proposal for the summer of '86 to be presented to Jackie Schwab and the Pinewoods, Inc. Board in August.

The next Board meeting will be held at the Church of Our Savior in Brookline on Friday, September 6, at 6:00 p.m. Any member interested in attending may contact Mary Stafford.

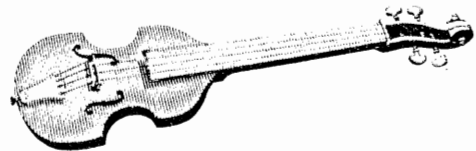
Message from the President

A Very Special Job
