ROOTS: HOW DID WE BEGIN?

Those who were at Pinewoods Camp this past summer surely enjoyed dancing in the enlarged hall called "C#" - C Sharp.

Cecil Sharp, the founder of our parent society, the English Folk Dance Society, was born in 1859, and educated at Cambridge, England, where he composed part songs, pianoforte music, and even an opera. He became Principal of the Hampstead Conservatoire of Music in 1896.

"But it was in 1899 that he first stumbled on the thing which, to him, meant new life-blood in music and dance..... It happened that Cecil Sharp was staying for Christmas at Headington in Oxfordshire, when suddenly he heard the sound of a concertina in the village street. It was playing a fine swinging tune which got louder and louder, and presently six strapping countrymen, gaily bedecked with fluttering ribbons and jingling bells, came dancing through the snow. The tune was stirring, the dance exciting; six men footing it as one, eager and vigorous, but restrained and dignified, their movements demanding the utmost agility and control, yet danced with that absolute ease which is the hallmark of a perfect technique; and he suddenly realized that here, hidden in the obscurity of a little English village, was a great art, its existence unsuspected by the majority, and its importance un-realized by the few who knew of it. To a man who loved English traditions as loyally as Cecil Sharp this seemed deplorable, and he determined that his fellow countrymen should at any rate be given the opportunity to share in his 'find'".

A CALL FOR APPLICATIONS FOR THE BOLLES SCHOLARSHIP

NEW DANCE DEPT.

This issue and the next contain some of the thoughts-ideas-brainstorms involved in composing New England and English Country dances. Featured here is Rich Jackson and his thoughts on creating the English Country dance entitled "Look Both Ways". --Ed.

"This dance was inspired by two events- the Boston Playford Ball, and an encounter with a trolley car. At the last Playford Ball, Bare Necessities did something they rarely do: switching tunes in the middle of a dance. During the dance "Old Noll's Jig", they switched to the tune, "Jump at the Sun". This fit the dance beautifully, so I decided to write a dance to fit this tune. The second event was an accident. I was "commissioned" to write a dance in remembrance of the encounter Joe Kynoch had with a couple of trolley cars while he was going for a cup of coffee. The result:

"LOOK BOTH WAYS"

Bar

- A1 - 1-4 1st corners change places by the right shoulder while turning single (as in Old Noll's Jig), then take right hands and turn half back to place.
2nd corners set and turn single.
- 5-8 2nd corners join 1st corners to make a right hand star.
- A2 - 1-8 Repeat A1 with 2nd corners changing first.
- B1 - 1-4 Men slip up four steps and back down.
Women slip down four steps and back up.
- 5-8 Circle once around to the left, slipping.
- B2 - 1-4 Half-pousette, 1st man pushing, 2nd man pulling.
- 5-8 2nd couple cast and lead back to progressed place.
1st couple lead up and cast down to progressed place.

"The first part of the dance has a similar figure to the beginning of "Old Noll's Jig", that is, changing places while turning single. This is a nice twirling figure that only appears in a few dances. For the next figure, I tried four or five different things for the second corners to do before I found this combination. This figure flows fairly well, and the momentum of the dancers is moving in the right direction for the right hand turn. The star leads nicely into the second corners crossing and into the B part. Some of this was planned, and some of it I didn't find out until I tried it.

"The second part of the dance was inspired by two trolley cars passing. Instead of trying to make this part a continuous flowing movement, I put in some planned changes of direction.
