The Ritual Committee Reports...

This year marks a major change in the format of our "ritual" classes, away from weekly series and towards one-day intensive workshops. This enables teachers and dancers from out of town to take part, as well as those who can't make a commitment for several weeks running. We did schedule two series of Morris classes, to try and meet everyone's needs. As we determine attendance patterns at the Saturday workshops, we will try to keep the cost of admission as low as possible while still covering expenses, especially with visiting teachers who require higher fees.

We got off to a rousing start in October with a Wednesday night series of four classes for beginning Morris dancers, taught by Shag Graetz. Based on the Ilmington tradition, the classes gave people a feel for the general style of the Morris, as well as for the special characteristics of the Ilmington dances. Tom Kruskal was the musician.

In November, Tony Poile (of Greenwich Guard) taught an advanced Rapper workshop, with music by Earl Gaddis. Tony focused on accuracy in stepping, consistency of style, and on the use of the Fool and Betty characters. Dancers experimented with different ways to perform figures, and learned a triangular 6-sword lock. The workshop was well-attended, with teams from Massachusetts, Connecticut, and Rhode Island represented.

December brought Ira Bernstein to town to teach three clog mini-workshops. In the open Appalachian class, he focused on style and rhythm, stressing the value of learning a small vocabulary of steps well. The Cape Breton class learned several reel-time steps (well-suited to freestyle clogging at New England contra dances). In the advanced Waltz Clog class, Ira taught several steps from the routines of Sam Sherry, who was a clog dancer in vaudeville. Ruthie Dornfeld provided the music for all three sessions.

Jan Elliott led a workshop for Morris musicians in January. She discussed the use of different instruments, and stressed the importance of imparting energy and rhythm through the music. Participants took turns playing for each other, with comments and suggestions both from Jan and from those dancing.

On Saturday, February 22, English visitor Trevor Stone, publisher of the sword-dance broadside *Rattle Up, My Boys*, will teach the dropped-step Helmsley longsword dance to experienced dancers. And our six-week Wednesday night Massed Morris series is planned for March and April. Check the enclosed flyers!

Dancing In White

by Patrice Bennet-Alder

When a member of my Morris Dance team died in a car accident three years ago, we were asked to dance at the memorial concert. This was a celebration of his life by the many musical groups he had been involved with or inspired. We could not bring ourselves to do it---we couldn't find a way to bridge the sorrow and reach the joy that the Morris expresses.

Although I could not Morris dance for my teammate so soon after his death, there was another time when *Dancing in White* was exactly what I wanted to do. Ironically, it was not until weeks afterwards that it occurred to me that I had been part of a ritual dance.

I saw a movie that showed a large open field. Thousands of spectators watched as groups of eight people in white unwrapped large pieces of cloth. One pile was unwrapped, then the team moved to the next pile while another team elsewhere on the field unwrapped their pile. It was like flowers on a pond opening in the morning sunlight.

After the movie, a speaker explained to the audience that we could take part in this event if we chose. When the event came to my community, I went to a planning meeting, and made sure to sign up for the unwrapping.

We were instructed to wear all white. I thought "I can manage that. I'll change the ribbons on the bottom of my Morris knickers from blue to white, and I'll be all set." It felt strange to use the costume of the Morris for another purpose. I had been tempted in the past to wear costumes from my folk dancing to Halloween parties, but my respect for the costume prevented this sort of demeaning use.

The day of the unwrapping arrived. This time the event took place in a large indoor arena with a concrete floor. We were assigned to our teams of eight, and rehearsed our role of opening the large pieces of cloth. They told us we were required to take off our shoes because we would have to step on the cloth. I had a moment of panic as I feared the return of the foot pain that had been aggravated by five years of pounding my legs into the ground and never leaping quite high enough. Choreographed movement by a small group of people wearing white felt familiar to me, but I had not yet made the connection on a conscious level.

We moved in slow straight silent lines from the edges of the arena to the first pile of cloth. It was neatly folded like a lotus blossom. We formed a circle around the pile and held hands for a moment. First the even-numbered people took a corner of the cloth to pull out and lay flat. Then the other people took a corner to unfold. This continued until the cloth was completely opened. We lifted the cloth over our heads and moved in a circle to align it squarely with the walls of the room. Then we carefully laid it down and moved in a slow silent line to the next
